What are the children tested in?

GPaS

Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling

There are two parts to the GPaS assessment Paper 1: short answer questions.

Paper 2: spelling.

Reading

The children will have a reading booklet containing text extracts and a separate answer booklet.

Maths

There are 3 parts to the Mathematics assessment.

Paper 1: arithmetic

Paper 2: reasoning

Paper 3: reasoning

There is no formal testing for writing, instead your child's outcome for writing is based upon continuous teacher assessment of writing produced throughout the year.

GPaS - Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling

A statutory test of English grammar, punctuation and spelling (GPaS)

- This test focuses on the more 'technical' aspects of English and is externally marked.
- The English Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling test (GPaS) has two components:
- Paper 1 short-answer questions
- Paper 2 spellings

GPaS - Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling

Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling (Paper 1) focuses on the following areas:

- Grammatical terms/word classes;
- · Functions of sentences;
- Combining words, phrases and clauses;
- · Verb forms, tenses and consistency;
- Punctuation:
- · Vocabulary;
- · Standard English and formality.

Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling (Paper 1) requires a range of answer types such as circling missing capital letters, multiple choice questions, one-word answers, but does not require longer formal answers.

Paper 2 - Spelling

Paper 2 is the spelling task. This consists of 20 sentences which will be read out to the children.

Each sentence has a word missing which the children must complete. The task is worth a total of 20 marks.

- 1. Sara wanted to be an explorer and ______ new lands.
- 2. The spy was sent on a secret ______
- For PE lessons, your clothes should be ______ and comfortable.

Reading

The assessment has been designed to measure whether children's comprehension of age-appropriate reading material meets the national standard.

This test consists of a separate reading booklet and a reading answer booklet.

• Children will have 3 texts to read in the reading booklet, completing the questions at their own pace. They can approach the test as they choose: e.g. working through one text and answering the questions before moving on to the next.

The reading paper may include any combination of non-fiction, fiction and/or poetry.

Children will have one hour to read the reading booklet and answer all the questions in the answer booklet.

Questions on the reading test require the children to:

- Show an understanding of the meaning of vocabulary in context
- Retrieve key details and quotations from text to demonstrate understanding
- · Summarise main ideas, events, characters and information
- Make developed predictions that are securely rooted in text
- Identify/explain how the choice of language enhances the meaning of texts
- Make accurate and appropriate comparisons within texts

The Year 6 Reading SATs paper requires a range of answering styles, including responding to multiple choice questions, one-word answers and multiple mark questions which require more formal paragraph-length answers.

- Questions are worth 1, 2 or 3 marks.
- · During reading activities and assessments throughout the year the children have been encouraged and reminded to use evidence from the text to support the answers that they make.

Maths

This test comes in 3 parts:

- Paper 1 (Arithmetic) 30 minutes
- Paper 2 (Reasoning) 40 minutes
- Paper 3 (Reasoning) 40 minutes


No calculators are allowed in any of the tests


Arithmetic


The arithmetic paper covers the four operations (division, multiplication, addition, subtraction and mixed operation calculations requiring BIDMAS), as well as number properties, calculating percentages of amounts, calculations using decimals, and calculations using fractions.

- 30 minutes for this test 40 marks from about 36 questions
- Each question is 1 mark except long multiplication and division questions they are 2 marks.
- · Children will need to be fluent with times tables and number facts to be successful because part of the challenge of this test is the timing.

Paper 2 and 3 - Reasoning

Each test is 40 minutes long and worth 35 marks

- Children are allowed pencils, eraser, ruler, protractor and mirror (all resources are provided)
- Questions will typically involve problem solving across several areas of maths
- These questions involve problem-solving and calculating within a context.


Paper 2 and 3 requires children to demonstrate their mathematical knowledge and skills, as well as their ability to solve problems and their mathematical reasoning.

Questions focus on the following Mathematical topic areas:

- Number and place value, including Roman Numerals;
- Addition, subtraction, multiplication and division (calculations);
- Geometry properties of shapes;
- Geometry position and direction;
- Statistics:
- Measurement including length, perimeter, mass (weight), volume, time and money;
- Algebra; Ratio and proportion;
- Fractions, decimals and percentages.

The questions get harder throughout the paper. It is not unusual for a child to be unable to complete the entire paper in time.





Where will the SATs take place in school?

SATs will take place in the classrooms. We will use additional classrooms within the school to allow your child to have plenty of space to complete the assessments.

Specific arrangements for SATs

Some pupils with specific needs may need additional arrangements so they can take part in key stage 2 tests. Types of support include:

- early opening of test packs, to adapt test papers
- additional time to complete the tests
- · the use of scribes, word processors or other technical or electronic aids
- making transcripts
- · written or oral translations
- readers
- the use of prompts and rest breaks

Some access arrangements (e.g. early opening, additional time etc.) must be applied for ahead of time. In these cases, there will be a discussion with the Parents and Carers by the class teacher/SENCO.

What sort of results are reported?

Once marked, the tests will be given the following scores:

- o A raw score (the total number of marks achieved for each paper);
- A scaled score (explained below);
- o A judgement of whether the National Standard has been met.

After marking each test, the external markers will convert each raw score into a scaled score to show whether each child is working below, at or above the national standard. Scaled scores change each year depending on the difficulty experienced nationally of the papers that year.

When the scaled score is given, it is given in a range from 80 to 120.

A scaled score of 100 or more is meeting the national standard. There are no separate tests for higher achieving pupils; however, a scaled score of 110 - 120 would show that a child is working above the national standard known as working at greater depth.

Reporting your child's results

The children's results are sent to school in July.

Parents and Carers will be informed of your child's SATs results within the end of year report.
